Racing Update

The days are getting longer, the flowers are in bloom, sun, wind, rain and no wind are part of our sailing challenges. We will be starting Wednesday Night Racing on April 22 and the Pacific Fleet Club is available to us.

Please note that Long Distance and Special races will still be held on Sundays.



While some boats were at home sailing the Turkish Triangle race four club boats participated in the 42nd running of Patos Island (Spanish for seal if you didn't know).

Patos Island is the first race in the Vancouver Island Racing Series. Goldcrest, Osprey and Eagle challenged the Long-Distance course but were defeated by the lack of wind and strong currents. Tom Eagle and his boat Shenanigans entered the Short Course finished in 3rd place. Congratulations!

The Turkish Triangle Race fared better in our home waters with Hessian, Bigfoot, Dark Star and Wave Reviews participating and Wave Reviews coming in first place. Congratulations!

Pursuit races use the race distance and the boats' PHRF to determine a start time for each competitor with the slowest boat starting first. The concept is like horse racing with the idea that weighting the start time means that all boats should end up at the finish at the same time. Unfortunately we all know that wind and current are not constant and thus greatly change the performance on course (if you watch racing live or replays you will hear about losers or winners winds).

Sometimes boats in the lead become becalmed and a wind fills in at the back of the fleet bringing boats who were far behind up to or passing the leading fleet. Other variations such as a lead boat getting and staying in good wind to clench line honours while the wind dies for those at the back with no chance of catching up.
